

Through the Years of the Manfred Community - The Businesses -



Manfred in 1907 with its prominent Railroad Boulevard

Envision the energetic activity of the early communities with the railroad, elevators, and businesses! Many of Manfred's first business buildings faced the elevators that flanked the railroad tracks. Buildings pictured above along Railroad Boulevard are from L/R: at the far west end is Rogers Lumber Co which has 'Roger Lumber Co' printed in white letters on the roof (west yard), Burkum Store, Willborg/Soderback Store, Elsaas and Sletten Store, Mead and Nelson Store, the former Kodalen Hotel, Nelson Meat Market, Nelson Feed Mill, Nelson Implement, in the foreground east of Lake Avenue is the former O. K. Melby lumberyard which was at that time the east yard of Rogers Lumber Co. The Anderson Livery and Dray line barn is pictured midway in town closer to the river. The newest buildings in this photo were Vang Lutheran Church and Hotel Johnson, both built in 1906.

Big changes came to Main Avenue by the end of 1908, when five building structures were added. New to the west side of Main, the C. C. Melby Department Store, and north from there were two buildings moved from Railroad Blvd-the Elsaas/Sletten and Mead/Nelson buildings, and north of these Nennie Johnson built his pool hall and barber shop. New on the east side of Main was Jens Renden's Blacksmith Shop. Also pictured at far left were the Burkum Store and Willborg/Soderback Store. Pictured in the foreground right of the blacksmith shop was the former Kodalen Hotel and right of that is pictured the meat market.

A Review of Businesses for Manfred, ND

This issue summarizes all known business entities that served the Manfred, North Dakota community through the many years. Each business was important to ensure the success of the community. Listed first in this history is the entity that literally put Manfred on the map, that of the railroad.

1. RAILROAD

1893 Soo Line – The railroad tracks through Wells County were completed in 1893, and the train began running that same year. The Minneapolis, St Paul, & Sault Ste Marie Railway, known as the Soo Line Railroad, was the initiating business for the creation of the future town of Manfred by setting up a water stop at this site and giving Manfred its name. Water stops were needed every 7-10 miles to resupply the steam engine with water and fuel such as coal. As a result, the James River at the site of Manfred was dammed to create a pond to draw water from for the steam engine. The railroad was crucial for transporting goods to and from Manfred, for the benefit of both the merchants and the farmers.

1953 Soo Line's last run of steam locomotives and the beginning of diesel locomotives

2009 CP – Soo Line Railroad sold to the Canadian Pacific Railroad Company (CP) which continues tooting its 'hello' to Manfred numerous times every day

2. GRAIN ELEVATORS Located south of Railroad Blvd

Grain elevators were erected along the railroad tracks enabling the grain from the elevator to be loaded directly to railroad cars to transport by rail to the grain mills located in larger cities. Manfred had five elevators.

- **1.**Woodworth Elevator was built in 1907. In 1929, it was purchased by the Riebe Grain Elevator Company and in 1940 was moved by rail to the west side of the O & M Elevator.
- 2. Osborne McMillan Elevator (O & M Elevator) was built in the late 1890s. O & M Elevator built a second elevator in 1907. The third elevator to join this complex in 1940 was #1 listed Woodworth Elevator. In 1991, this set of three elevators became the Manfred Grain Company, and in 2010 this complex was demolished.
- **3.** Royal Elevator was built in 1894 as Manfred's first elevator. In 1907, it was purchased by Regan and Lyness; in 1928, purchased by Riebe Grain Elevator Company; and in 1942, it was moved by rail to the site of Manfred Farmers Elevator.
- **4.** Manfred Farmers Elevator was built in 1905. Elevator #3 was moved to this site in 1942, and in 1957 an additional elevator was constructed. This elevator complex was also known as the Farmers Union Elevator and later became the Manfred Station of the Fessenden Cooperative Association. Elevator #3 of this elevator complex was later demolished.
- 5. C.G. Ireys Elevator was built in early 1900. George Reiter purchased it in the late 1920s. Fate unknown.

3. CHURCHES AND SCHOOLS

Of great importance to settlers establishing new communities was to organize churches and schools. Unlike other 'business' endeavors instituted by entrepreneurs for a financial gain, religious and educational endeavors stemmed from the settlers' desire to have these foundational entities in their lives.

Churches

In the Manfred trade area, six churches were built - listed below. Those of the Catholic faith attended St. Augustine Church-Fessenden or St. Cecelia Church-Harvey. Several of the Baptist faith attended the First German Baptist Church-Fessenden, and those of the Congregational faith attended the Congregational Church of Fessenden.

Schools

1892 Public schooling for Manfred Township and St. Anna Township began with the two townships combined as the St. Anna School District

1897 Two school districts formed: Manfred School District #20 and St. Anna School District #21

Manfred School District had 3 one-room schools until schools #2 and #3 closed and transferred to #1 in Manfred:

School #1 - In Manfred 1895-1910. In 1910, sold and moved to become a home

School #2 – Northeast of Manfred-first on Nertrost land 1895-1915, then on Solberg land 1915-1935

School #3 - Northwest of Manfred on Rogness land 1895-1928

1910 Manfred School -Red brick school built Original Townsite-Bk1, Lots 7, 8, 9, 10

1973 Manfred School District #20 dissolved, and the remaining students transferred to either the Fessenden School District or the Harvey School District

1974 Purchased by the Johnson family and renovated to serve as a home for Dianne Aull and family

1993 Purchased by Harry Detling

2006 Manfred School purchased by the non-profit organization Rural Vestige Alliance for the Manfred projects

2017 Transferred to Manfred History and Preservation, Inc.

4. TELEPHONE AND ELECTRICITY

Telephone Service for the Manfred Community

1908 Two phone companies organized: Manfred-Fram Telephone Co. and Merchants Telephone Co. which soon joined together as Manfred-Fram Telephone Co.

1909 Central Office building constructed Original Townsite-NE corner Bk 3, Lot 8

1917 Addition built on the Central Office

1927 Coal shed constructed

1954 The phone system was in poor condition, so farmers joined together to rebuild their lines with the assistance of Bell Telephone

1962 Bell Telephone bought out the local telephone groups in about 1962

1993 North Dakota Telephone Company (NDTC) became the service provider

4. TELEPHONE AND ELECTRICITY (cont.)

The Coming of Electricity

Kerosene lamps provided lighting in the first years, before the Delco-Light system was introduced in 1916. Joe Biever was the Delco light man based in Fessenden. Of the many Delco Light plants installed, these were noted in the Wells County Free Press: in 1924 Hanson and Halvorson Store strung a wire to light Jens Renden's blacksmith shop, and in 1928 Andrew Solberg installed an electric light plant on his farm. The Otter Tail Power Company of Fergus Falls, MN, founded in 1909, was working its way westward erecting poles and stringing wire to connect small communities to electricity. The highline poles came through Manfred in 1927. Farms along the pathway of the poles between towns were able to connect to the electrical poles. During World War II, the installation process was put on hold but began again about 1947. It wasn't until the early 1950s that the Manfred trade area was fully connected to electricity.

Helland Electric Original Townsite-B3, middle of Lot 6

Arnie Helland had an electrical shop in Manfred as 'Helland Electric' for a short time in the 1950s before moving his business to Harvey. His shop in Manfred was located between the bank/post office building to the north and the Cash Store to the south. The footprint of this building can still be seen. Building fate unknown.

5. POST OFFICE Established at Manfred in a mercantile business on May 3, 1894

6. LUMBER

Rogers Lumber Company

1894 The first business in Manfred – Rogers Lumber Company with Gullik Nordtorp, manage, located on Gullik's land on the outskirts west of Manfred. (1st location) Gullik moved back to Norway in 1899

1899 Gullik's friend, O. S. Hedahl, became manager and moved building to Railroad Boulevard (2nd location-see page 1)

1912 Building relocated from west yard to east yard (3rd location)

1932 Business closed (See Service Station for use of this building from 1933 and on)

Manfred Lumber Company Le Grand's Addition-Bk 1, Lot 12

1902 O. K. Melby established the Manfred Lumber Company in 1902

1908 Sold to Rogers Lumber Company and became its east yard

Langworthy Lumber Company (unknown location though we have a photo of it)

1907 Langworthy Lumber set up in many communities

1910 Manfred news entry reported, "The two lumberyards at this place have been made into one, the Rogers yard taking over the stock of the Langworthy yard and the later company leaving Manfred."



8. MEDICAL

Midwives During early pioneer and settlement years, midwives were often summoned to assist women in childbirth. The midwife came to the couple's home when the time neared for the baby to be born, gave assistance during the birth and stayed afterward to keep a watch on the mother and baby 1909-1913 Dr. P. A. Boyum 'Peter Arndt'-His office and residence were on second level of the C. C. Melby Store 1910-1914 Anderson Drug, Otto Anderson-Druggist, Drug store was next door to Dr. Boyum's upstairs office 1914-1920 Dr. W. R. Owen 'William Roy'-In 1914, Dr. Owen rented vacated drug store and set up both his office

and his apartment. In 1917, he moved into his new home and office. Later, this was the home of P.B. Anderson, and then served as Elevator House for managers of the Manfred Farmer Elevator

9. GENERAL MERCHANDISE AND GROCERY

Rogne and Burkum Mercantile/Burkum Store Original Townsite-Block 3, Lot 8

1894 Torstein K. Rogne and Lars Burkum opened the first store in Manfred as 'Rogne and Burkum Mercantile'

1901 After Rogne sold his share to Burkum, it continued as the 'Burkum Store'

1905 Lars Burkum built a new building and continued a successful business

1916 H. B. Myhre bought out Lars O. Burkum

1917 Anton Aasand and Nick Halvorson as 'Aasand and Halverson Store'

1925 H. R. Jenner purchased the building

1926 Nennie Johnson purchased the building and sold it to 'Fagerlund Sons of Norway Lodge'

1952 Served as 'Fagerlund Sons of Norway Lodge' building until it burned down the fall of 1952

Sletten and Elsaas Store Original Townsite-Bk 3, Lot 4 – moved to Original Townsite-Bk 3, North end of Lot 5

1903 Or before, was owned by Otto Sletten and John J. Elsaas as the 'Sletten and Elsaas Store'

1906 John Elsaas left Manfred to start a new store in Pekin. The building rented as a pool hall

1908 Otto Sletten sold lot and building to C. C. Melby who turned it to face Main and rented it as the Manfred Post Office until 1915

1915 Or after, Ford Supplies business for unknown length of time. Fate of the building is unknown

1908 C. C. Melby built 'C. C. Melby Store' with a community hall and doctor's office on the second level

Early 1920s C. C. Melby sold to Lars Rodne (Rodney) and Andrew Erickson as 'Rodney-Erickson Cash Store'

1925 Rodne and Erickson sold to Anton Aasand and Nennie Johnson as 'Aasand and Johnson'

1927 Andrew Flatlien purchased the business


1928 Andrew Flatlien sold to C. C. Melby, Ann Cook operated the store

1930 C. C. Melby died in California. Ann had a closing sale in November 1930 and moved to California to help her mother

1936 The remaining store merchandise was sold

1939 The building was taken down

1941 Nennie Johnson purchased the empty Lots 4 and 5 in Block 3, creating a park for Manfred



1900 John Benson and S. N. Willborg built this store. Benson sold out to Willborg in 1903

1917 The store was sold to Olaf Roble and V. F. Hanson as 'Roble & Hanson'

1918 Roble and Hanson sold the store to John Weber







11. OX AND HORSEPOWER

Transportation for the early settlers was by train or ox and horse. Oxen were the powerhouse for settlers when they moved to their homesteads and were also used to pull the breaking plow because of their strength and endurance to break the sod. Oxen were replaced by horses for their speed in both fieldwork and transportation.

Olaf Anderson >

1900 Olaf Anderson started a livery, feed stable and a dray service He had an ice business cutting ice from the James River to ship

1909 By 1909, he was selling Ford, Regal, and Reo along with his livery/dray line

1930 Fire destroyed the barn of which Olaf said he would rebuild, however Olaf died in 1931 so the barn was never rebuilt and his business activities closed down

12. BUTCHER SHOPS AND MEAT MARKETS

Janisch Butcher Shop 1 mile west of Manfred

This butcher shop was located on the Janisch homestead

Manfred Meat Market Original Townsite-Bk 4, West part of Lot 9 located at the south corner on the east side of Main

1900 John Nelson had a butcher shop, feed grinding mill, and a coal and wood business on this property

1908 Ole Rostvedt bought out John Nelson's butcher shop, the coal and wood yard, and feed mill

1909 Carl Johnson the next butcher until April 1911 when he homesteaded in Montana

1911 J. E. Jensen the new butcher in lease to own – had help from his brothers George and Ole

1913 In April, sold to J. J. Erickson, his help was Ole Jensen who took over ownership with his brother Henry

1915 David and Augusta Wolff purchased from Jensen then sold to Wilhelm and Anna Goedecke

1917 Emil and Ilse Minnie Bundt – M.N. Bundt Meat Market

1922 John Wagner was the final owner of this meat market business

1925 Haakan A. Tessem purchased the building and moved it to Lincoln Ave to become his home

G. D. Fisher Implement Original Townsite-Bk 4, Lots 9 and 10

1926 Martin Melby and Oscar Ongstad bought out O. K. Melby

1816 He built his home just north of his businesses on Original Townsite-Bk4, Lot 7

1925 John's wife died in 1925 and in December he sold to Gilman and Adolph Shirley as 'Shirley Brothers' backed by their father Emil, selling McCormick Machinery, Chryslers, and installed a Standard Oil gas pump

1929 The Shirley Brothers business closed, and Emil Shirley rented the Nelson/Shirley building to Rudolph Peterson who operated it as a repair shop. Emil sold the John Nelson house and moved it to Harvey

1933 Emil Shirley sold the property to Richard Jorstad who was planning to use the building as a repair shop

1935 Reier Reistad purchased the property from Richard Jorstad

1937 Ole Posttuen purchased the implement building from Reier Reistad and moved it to his farm

Service Station *Le Grand Addition-Bk 1, Lot 12*

1933 Rudolph and Nora Peterson purchased and remodeled Rogers Lumber building as a service station, moved it east further into the lot to enable gas pumps to be installed in front, service entrance was in the rear

1945 Harley and Lydia Boese purchased it, but couldn't continue because of health challenges at the time

1945 Helmer and Annie Solheim purchased to serve as a service station

1969 Ted Jorstad purchased as a service station



15. CONTRACTORS

STONE MASONS

Stone masons cut stones to use in building foundations. A few examples of existing stone foundations include Manfred School, the bank/post office building, and houses like the Solheim House, Ostrem House, and Anderson House. Here are known masons and an example of their work:

1905 Reier and Ole Reistad built the Burkum Store foundation

CARPENTERS

Many of the settlers had carpentry skills to build their first buildings. But there were others who specialized in carpentry, though they were not often listed in the Manfred News entries. The following are a few examples of the many people who did carpentry:

1906 Mr. Beito and a crew of five men from South Dakota erected Vang Lutheran Church

1906 Fred Johnson and men erected Hotel Johnson

1908 Hans Opsahl built an addition on the A. Fisher home

1910 Church members erected a new building for the Seventh Day Adventist Church

1914 H. A. Tessem and John Aasand erected a barn for O. Brye

1915 H. A. Tessem, Halvor Saelid (Olsen), Jens and Olaf Bratten erecting a barn on O. K. Melby farm

1915 Phillip and Gottlieb Deede built many barns in the region beginning this year

1924 Several church members erected a new garage for the Vang parsonage

1925 Louis Rodne helped Nennie Johnson build an addition to his store

1928 Melland Bros of Wellsburg built a house for Nels Nertrost



WELLS AND WINDMILLS

To serve as their first well, the first settlers would dig into the ground until reaching water. In addition to providing water, a well was a place to keep food items cool by hanging them in the well. Because of all the out houses, the ground water in Manfred became contaminated so water needed to be boiled to sterilize. A few of the many well and windmill installations were noted in the Wells County Free Press:

1906 K. Kleven and crew installed a well for Soo Line Depot

1906 Postmaster Willborg had a well dug for his residence

1912 Water analysis showed poor quality of six Manfred wells

1925 Wells were reported dry with the need to haul water

1926 John Smith and Mike Seil installed a well for Nennie Johnson

1929 George Remillard installed a well for Edwin Hedahl

16. POOL HALLS AND BARBER SHOPS

POOL HALLS

By 1903, Nennie Johnson was operating a barber shop and pool hall-location unknown, during 1906-1907 the Sletton and Elsaas building rented as a pool hall, Manfred Hotel had a pool hall during its years of operation

Johnson's Place

1908 Nennie Johnson built a pool hall and barber shop which included a soft drink fountain See Cash Store for continued use of this building

BARBERS People who were known to have worked as barbers, providing shaves, trimming beards, and haircuts:

Nennie Johnson began barbering before 1903 and continued until about 1920

- J. B. Dingman had a shops, barbered in Johnson's pool hall, and in the hotel
- I. T. Bassett
- R. A. Stone used the barber shop in the hotel

Martin Stuberg barbered at Bk 4, Lot 13, a small building north of the hotel

17. OTHER COMMUNITY SERVICES

Ice Cutting

Cutting ice blocks on the James River supplied ice for the train and other needs in communities along the train route as well as local needs. Ice block cutters at Manfred were John Nelson and Olaf Anderson.

Cream Station

Buying cream from the farmers and testing it was a side business as a cream station that rotated to many of the businesses through the years.

Seamstress

Even though many homemakers sewed for themselves and their family, some also sewed for others in the community. Olga Anderson and Marie Renden were two well-known seamstresses.

Millinery Shops (Hat makers)

Manfred had a few millinery shops in the earlier years: Sorenson Millinery, Willborg Millinery, and Soderback Millinery that were attached buildings to their husband's stores.

Jewelry


George Gilbertson opened a jewelry store in 1911 in a Manfred barbershop.

Door-to-Door

It was common for salesmen to stay at the hotel and rent a buggy from the livery and travel farm-to-farm or door-to-door in taking orders for various companies. It is known that Ernest Braaten had a good business selling McNess Products such as medicine, spices, and brushes from his vehicle. The Manfred area was also in the district for Otto Schmidt in selling the Ward Line products.

Formation of the town of Manfred

The 'Original Townsite' was plated west of Lake St (now Lake Ave after the 911 addresses were established), from land of F. J. Janisch and Christ Roble. When the lots of the 'Original Townsite' had nearly been sold, Alex Le Grand platted part of his farmland which became known as 'Le Grand's Addition' located on the east side of Lake Ave.

The town platted into Blocks

The 'Original Townsite' is divided into 8 blocks: Block 1 contains the church and school. Block 2 (Triangle) contained the main hardware store. Blocks 3 and 4 contained most of the businesses, a few of which are still in existence including the Cash Store, Bank/Post Office, Garage, and Hotel. 'Le Grand's Addition' is divided into 2 blocks. Businesses in 'Le Grand's Addition' were Manfred Evangelical Church and the still-existing Service Station.
