Dedication Day

July 26, 2003, the 'birth' of the Manfred Heritage Museum!

A significant event for Manfred, for Wells County, for the state and the nation!

A museum dedicated in honor of America's rural places!

Dedication Day began with a tour in the morning of the Wells County Museum where visitors had the opportunity to view the Anderson Room, the Viking Ship replica, and other exhibits. The dedication ceremony at Manfred in the afternoon began with great honor at the bank-post office building where the American Legion Color Guard presented the colors. The American flag was then raised on the bank-post office flagpole by Edgar Flick the former owner of this building, and the National Anthem was played by the Harvey City Band.

The dedication program continued at the south lawn of the Melby-Rogness Home, beginning with a prayer by Paul Gunderson, a story with the children by Wanda Melchert, recognizing the volunteers, messages given by state officials and local folks excerpts of which are found on pages 6 and 7, a song written and sung for the dedication by Laverne Johnson, and the ribbon cutting ceremony as shown on page 1. The three buildings included in the dedication were also participants in their own way: the bank-post office with the raising of the American flag on its flag pole, the Melby-Rogness Home with Myrtle Rogness pressing its door bell, and Vang Lutheran Church with Pete Anderson ringing its bell.

Concluding the dedication was a musical program by the Harvey City Band whose sounds were enjoyed throughout the village as people viewed the buildings or took a walking tour. Soft-serve ice cream was served in the Vang church basement, and handcrafted items were for sale there by Verna Bowers with one half the proceeds going to MHP, Inc. This remarkable and successful day for Manfred was perfectly wonderful, and much enjoyed by everyone.

As I was driving into Manfred today, I thought Manfred is not just history anymore. Manfred continues to make history, and all of us here today are a part of that. Preservation North Dakota, of which I am the Executive Director, held our annual historic preservation conference in 2000 right here in Manfred. That conference showcased the spectacular Vang Lutheran Church. But during that conference, it was very evident to all those in attendance that the community of Manfred had such a strong sense of place and a strong sense of community. I think that is evident here again today. Vang Lutheran was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 2001. I was pleased to be on the review board at that time. To my knowledge, Manfred had the largest ever contingent of people accepting a National Register nomination! Preservation North Dakota was pleased to award the Vang Lutheran Church a Grass Roots Preservation Grant in 2002. We helped them with some foundation work and some gutter work. Vang Lutheran Church is truly one of North Dakota's most inspiring Prairie Churches!

The community of Manfred has a great story to share, and a strong sense of place to convey. The efforts here to preserve and interpret Manfred's history won all of those involved 'The Preservation Success Story' award from Preservation North Dakota in 2002. The efforts here are unmatched in towns several hundreds or thousands the size of the community of Manfred and this is important! I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for allowing me to share in the progress here in Manfred and this celebration today. I would like to offer you my heartfelt thank you for all of those involved in the projects. I urge you to continue to make history in Manfred and continue to celebrate your past.

It is great to be here! It's an honor and a privilege to come to Manfred on this special day. I'm from a place not too far away from here, Finley. But really, it's Sherbrooke and Pickard. Sherbrooke is gone! It's now only in memory. Sherbrooke is where I grew up. People left and didn't stay with it, and so it's a ghost town now. All there are, is memories... a few little buildings... a few little stones here and there. But, it's gone, except in my memory and in my heart. Things like that are happening all over North Dakota. It's hard to see it.

I think Manfred sets a great example for the local area, for our state, and for our great nation. Efforts like this are what we need in order to hold onto our past. We all need to know where we came from, where we're going. Places like this are called home base. You never forget them. We work with a lot of preservation programs and try to help where we can. I've got a great staff of people that have background and training, where they can help provide technical assistance. But, what makes me feel best, is when I see the people get involved... when the people say "We can do this, and let's get together and get it to work." It comes from the heart of both the people from my staff, and from the people that really work there. This is what is happening right here in Manfred. It's coming from you.

I would also like to point out what a great partner Preservation North Dakota is! They bridge that gap between state government operation and help on the grass-roots level. That's where our strength is. Volunteers are our strength, and people who jump in and try to make a difference. What a great example Manfred is! Congratulations to all the people who have worked on this wonderful, wonderful project! I see not only a past, but I see a great future. Thank you to you! Keep up the good work. Congratulations! Give us a call when you need some help.

Mary Kate Ryan, Architectural Historian for the State Historical Society of North Dakota Mary Kate will help guide Manfred's upcoming National Register nominations

Hi! I am Mary Kate Ryan, the brand new architectural historian for the State Historical Society of North Dakota. Yesterday, we held our state Historic Preservation Review Board meeting, of which I am the secretary. This is the board that reviews the National Register nominations. We had a discussion about one of the major problems in preservation- that people come into a town like Manfred and they see buildings that are dilapidated and falling down. What they lack is the vision to see what they could be like after preservation. And that is what the people of Manfred have.

We have the Vang Lutheran Church that was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2001. With that recognition, one of the main things that comes is that people start realizing that this is an important historic place in the history of this town, of this township, of this county, and therefore of the state. So this vision to see what things could be like after preservation, is what we need in this state. We need to preserve the historic resources that bring people to North Dakota, that tell the story of North Dakota. That is what has happened here! Manfred is a great example of what can happen when people have vision.



Since that time, the projects have garnered much interest and success. The non-profit organization Manfred History and Preservation, Inc. (MHP, Inc.) was founded July 25, 2000, and then on June 21, 2001 Vang Lutheran Church was listed on the national register. In 2002, MHP, Inc. was named North Dakota's "Preservation Success Story for 2002" by Preservation North Dakota. The newsletter, 'The New Manfred News,' and the 'manfrednd.org' website are both receiving high praise. Audrey Solheim, Manfred's historian is busy gathering the history of Manfred, MHP, Inc. is currently overseeing restoration of the Melby-Rogness Home, and other National Register nominations are planned.

With the Manfred Heritage Museum now begun, we need to give thought toward ensuring its existence long into the future. We would not wish for our dedicated efforts to be all for naught. It would be wonderful to think that Manfred might still be sharing its story 100 or 200 years from now. We who care about Manfred and possess memories of this place are the ones who can ensure its future by remembering Manfred in our financial and estate planning. Manfred has a wonderful story to share of rural America with both the present and the future generations.

His first adventure in woodworking occurred in 1946 with the desire to build a dollhouse for his daughter Carol and a small barn for his son Loren. Then in 1974 when he retired from farming, he was able to begin in earnest to explore the craft of woodworking. His wide interest in working with many different woods spans from carving by hand to creating designs using power tools, large to small projects, the common down-to-earth themes of life to the humorous, and the intricate to the simple... all beautifully made and treasured by the many people blessed to receive these wooden creations. Members of his family have gladly joined Clarence in various aspects of his craft such as helping with scaling the patterns and painting on his creations. 

A few of the hand tools Clarence uses include: at top, a whittling knife he used to carve the dog, and below are two carving tools used on such things as the hand bellows pictured above.




Many recipe/note-holder rabbits have been made and given away, many of them painted by Lena

The weathervane tower is of pine odds & ends leftover from projects through the years. Clarence made the vane using a scroll saw. The horse was drawn by him and the arrow by his daughter-in-law Kathy.





The legs of the rocking horse shown above move when the horse is in rocking motion. The sleigh at left recalls the means of winter travel in the days of the early settlers.

Clarence's most recent project has been to create a replica of the City of Harvey's old water tower. He began work on it in January 2003 and finished in time to show at the Wells County Fair in June 2003, where he won a blue ribbon and also the Reserve Champion award ribbon in its category.
