Reed Organ Contributions

Gratefully received this year into the Manfred Heritage Museum artifact collection are two reed (pump) organs.

The Beckwith Church Organ

The Beckwith Church Organ came from Lowell and Karen Jensen of Bismarck, restored by Lowell's father Maurice Jensen of Stanley. This organ is located in Vang Lutheran Church and is played for the Sunday worship services. Vang Church originally had an organ similar to this one which members recall.

Preparation for the restoration of Manfred School is coming along very well!

Memories of Manfred School

Memories of Manfred School are a great treasure. To you former students and teachers, please give thought to writing down your memories of Manfred School. Such memories add much richness to the history and would be most welcome! Below are memories by two former students, Orvin Ongstad and Muriel (Melby) Schwartz Boyum, who were classmates at Manfred School September 1927 – June 1935.

School Memories of Orvin Ongstad

"I always looked forward to the start of school. There was so much to learn and so many friends to play with. We could go to the store and buy pencils and paper in preparation for school. The paper pads we got when we first started school where thick but small. I think the sheets were something like 4" x 6". I noticed that the upper grades had nice big tablets and I looked forward to the time when I too could buy the big 8.5" x 11" tablets because you could write so much more on a single sheet with those larger pages.

Spring always brought with it a lot of activity for us kids. At school we would practice things like high jumping, pole vaulting, throwing the shot put, getting ready for the county "Play Day" event held in Fessenden each spring. They would give ribbons to the first three places in each of the events. I liked it because I usually came home with various ribbons — and in the later grades, they were usually the blue ones.

In the wintertime, we would always spend our recesses down at the river skating or using our sleds on the banks on the side of the river. Other times we would play a game called "Pump, Pump, Pull Away". One person would be chosen to be "it" and would stand in the middle of the road in front of the school while all the rest of the kids would be lined up against the wall of the school. The object was to run across the street to the other side without being touched by whoever was "it". If you were touched then you too would have to be an "it". When the "its" called out "Pump, Pump, Pull Away", everyone had to run across the street. The game continued until all were touched and were "its".

I liked history and read every book I could find on the early history of our country. There was a bookcase in the classroom where extra books were stored and one could go there during class and pull out for reading any book that caught your attention. I especially liked the books about the early west – back in the 1700s, the west was the Appalachian mountain area – and about the "mountain men" and their wars against the Indians and the British and the French."

School Memories of Muriel (Melby) Boyum

"When I was in the primary grades, we always used horse and buggy or sled to get to school. The school had a barn where we would keep our horses. Many times we would pick up Perry Anderson's children. On the buggy, we had just one seat, but three or four of us kids could sit on that. Some rode in a bucket behind the seat. We used the horse-hide robe to cover us and, boy, that was nice and warm. We girls always wore dresses in school, never slacks. But in the winter, we had woolen snow suits we'd put on over our clothes for traveling in the buggy or sled to school.

My teacher in the primary grades was Agnes Langseth. At that time, Manfred School used the two rooms downstairs and the two rooms upstairs. When I moved up the grades to the next room, T.L. Nettleton was the teacher and then Mildred Ongstad for the rest of my grade school years. As I progressed into the next grades, it soon developed that the upper grades were moved downstairs. All my classes were downstairs. The principal's office remained upstairs.

For a long time in my class, there were only about six boys and one girl, and I was that one girl. Phyllis and Eileen Biever had skipped grades: Phyllis skipped two grades and Eileen skipped one. Then Gerda Gladheim moved in when she was an 8th grader. We were the four girls in the class then.

We didn't have to walk home from school very much, but once in awhile we would. I enjoyed running, so I'd run the length of three telephone poles, then walk one, run three, walk one all the way home from Manfred.

All the smaller towns like Manfred were Class C schools. All the students in these schools were required to take the state examinations. In the 7th grade, we tested in two of the subjects, and then in the 8th grade, we took exams for all the other subjects. These exams were not easy to prepare for because the teachers never knew what questions somebody else would prepare for us. Everybody was frightened about these tests, students and teachers alike. So, we really did a lot of studying in everyway that we could. We all studied hard, and we had very good teachers."



Wells County Free Press News Entries

September 7, 1933

School opened here Monday with Miss Mildred Ongstad teaching the upper grades and Miss Langlie in the lower grades. Oscar Ongstad is the new janitor for the school this year.

November 9, 1933

Miss Mildred Ongstad, Miss Eleanor Langlie, and Myrtle Melby accompanied Herbert and his mother, Mrs. S. H. Ongstad, to Minot where they attended a teacher's convention. They left Thursday and returned Sunday.

November 2, 1933

The school children held a Halloween party in the schoolrooms Tuesday afternoon.

November 22, 1933

The 4-H Club members and their leaders met in the schoolrooms Friday evening.

December 21, 1933

A Christmas program will be given Friday evening in the Sons of Norway hall by the Manfred School and everyone is cordially invited.

January 4, 1934

A large number of young folks went on a sleigh ride party which ended up at the home of Mildred Ongstad where a delicious lunch was served and a very enjoyable evening was spent.

March 15, 1934

Misses Langlie and Ongstad are preparing their pupils for Declamation contest, which will soon be held in Fessenden.

March 22, 1934

The Manfred Homemakers Club served lunch in the schoolhouse on Election Day.

May 17, 1934

Misses Mildred Ongstad and Eleanor Langlie and pupils drove to Fessenden Friday and took in Play Day. We are very proud of our school children as they have won the shield 2 years and we wish them luck in years to come.

June 7, 1934

The school children held their picnic at the Hedahl grove Friday afternoon.

June 7, 1934

Graduation exercises were held in the Sons of Norway hall Friday evening. A large crowd attended and after graduation a farewell party was given in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Con Hedahl and family. The Hedahl family moved to Sawyer.

June 7, 1934

Miss Eleanor Langlie left for her home at Lansford after completing a successful term of school.

Wells County Free Press News Entries

August 23, 1934

Helmer Solheim is redecorating the school house and putting it in condition for the opening of school.

September 6, 1934

School started in full swing Tuesday with Miss Mildred Ongstad as teacher in the upper grades and Miss Langlie in the lower grades.

November 15, 1934

School was closed Wednesday for a few days as the teachers attended a convention in Fargo. Cora and Myrtle Melby, Mildred Ongstad, and Eleanor Langlie returned Saturday evening from Fargo.

April 4, 1935

The annual Wells County Music Contest, in which contestants from the entire county from both high school and grades participate, will be held in Fessenden next Monday, April 8th. The affair has attracted much attention in the past year, and the musical ability of the contestants always draws a large crowd of followers who take in both the afternoon and evening session with a degree of great interest. Entries from Manfred include: Mixed Chorus; Norma Olson, vocal solo; George Ravnaas, vocal solo; Norma Olson, Cecelia Ravnaas, vocal duet; Margaret Anderson, piano solo; Orlien Melby, vocal solo; and Phyllis Biever, Eileen Biever, piano duet.

May 16, 1935

Play Day was held last Friday May 10th in a biting wind and cold wave that lasted all day and wound up in a rain storm. The meet was well attended, however, and keen interest was shown in the various events. Students from Manfred were: Robert Nelson, broad jump, high jump, baseball throw, and pole vault; Walter Ongstad, shot put; Orlien Melby, shot put, and pole vault; Orvin Ongstad, 100 yard dash, running broad jump, high jump, and shot put; Thomas Nelson, running broad jump, shot put, and pole vault; Violet Boese, 40 yard dash, standing broad jump, and high jump; Margaret Anderson, 40 yard dash, standing broad jump, running broad jump, and high jump; Florence Bendickson, running broad jump; Helen Bendickson, 50 yard dash, running broad jump, and high jump; Phyllis Biever, standing broad jump; Nora Ongstad, high jump; Adeline Koenig, 60 yard dash, and standing broad jump; Gerda Gladheim, 60 yard dash, and running broad jump; Muriel Melby, high jump; and Luella Boese, high jump.

June 27, 1935

Eighth grade graduation exercises were held in the Sons of Norway hall Thursday evening. Seven boys and girls graduated and a very lovely program was rendered and a very interesting talk was given by Wm. W. Barr, county superintendent. The following from Manfred is a list of the eighth grade pupils of 1934-35 who received completion diplomas recently: Eileen Biever, Phyllis Biever, Ervin Boese, Gerda Gladheim, Muriel Melby, Thomas Nelson, and Orvin Ongstad.

September 5, 1935

Lower - Grades 1-4

Monday Sept. 9th will be the opening day of school in Manfred. Miss Mildred Ongstad will have the upper grades and Miss Myrtle Melby will have the lower grades.

November 14, 1935

Miss Mildred Ongstad and Miss Myrtle Melby left for Bismarck Wednesday to be present at the State Teachers Institute which is being held at Bismarck this week.

April 9, 1936

Winners for the annual Wells County Music Festival were announced by County Supt. of Schools, Wm. W. Barr this week. In spite of the bad weather encountered early Monday, all of the contestants were able to appear and take part in the contest. Again this year the contestants were rated according to degree of perfection and not in numerical rank. Winners from Manfred were: Rhythm Band; Mixed Vocal Group; Norma Olsen, vocal solo; Edwin Tofte, vocal solo; Luella Boese and Norma Olsen, vocal duet.

May 21, 1936

Many pupils from all schools in the county took part in the annual Play Day. Just released is a list of all point winners. Included on the list are representatives of all schools in the county, both rural and city, and also listed are the winners of the various trophies. Students winners from Manfred include: Florence Bendickson, running broad jump; Helen Bendickson, 70 yard dash, running broad jump, high jump; Marvin Biever, high jump, pole vault;; Luella Boese, 70 yard dash, high jump; Violet Boese, 50 yard dash, standing broad jump; Lester Elton, pole vault; Doris Gladheim, running broad jump; Gerda Gladheim, standing broad jump; Ordean Gladheim, pole vault; Verna Jenny, standing broad jump; Donald Melby, 75 yard dash, running broad jump; Kenneth Melby, 60 yard dash, high jump, pole vault, baseball throw; Orlien Melby, 75 yard dash, high jump, pole vault; Walter Ongstad, 75 yard dash, 8 lb. shot put; Edwin Tofte, 100 yard dash, running broad jump; Helen Tofte, standing broad jump; and Ted Weigelt, high jump. Manfred won the 240 yard relay and the 200 yard relay.

June 11, 1936

School election was held in the Manfred school house Tuesday.

A large number of folks attended the Operetta which was given in the Sons of Norway hall Thursday evening by the school children.

June 11, 1936

Misses Mildred Ongstad and Myrtle Melby closed a successful term of school Friday with a number of 8th grade graduates.
