The History of Schools in Manfred Township

Perhaps no activity is more significant for a community than education of the generations of its residents. It is a pleasure to begin with this issue, a series on the history of schools in Manfred Township.

One-Room Schools This issue is devoted to the one-room school houses. What was a one-room school like? Children and even a few young adults of grade levels 1-8 were taught in one room by one teacher. The teacher often also served as the janitor. In the 1890s, the teacher's salary was generally \$35 per month and \$5 for janitor work. A coal-heated stove made it possible to hold classes during the winter. Those who brought a potato to bake would put it on the stove first thing in the morning, and by noon it would be ready to eat. There was no school bus system in those early years, so either parents or people of the community helped transport children by horse-drawn wagons and buggies. The teacher often boarded with a farm family living near the school. The one-room school was an important center for the community. It was used not only for school but also by organizations of the community to hold their meetings and other functions such as the directors of the Manfred Farmer's Elevator Co and of the Manfred School District, musical programs, basket socials, ladies aid, and homemakers' club. Vang Lutheran Church congregation met in either Manfred School #1 or #2 until their building was built in 1906.

Acknowledgements The acknowledgements with much gratitude for the Manfred school history are many: beginning with appreciation to the settlers who desired education for their children, to the people of the community who served on the school board, to the local businesses and other people who provided supplies and services, to the county superintendents and county nurses who made periodic visits to the Manfred schools, and to the many teachers who guided young minds. The compiling of this history was accomplished by historian Audrey Solheim through her work of transcribing school board minutes into the computer; making lists of teachers and students; and gathering, scanning and organizing school photos. A large photo collection was given by former Manfred teacher, Myrtle Rogness. Other people have also provided images of school photos, as well as memories. As this series begins, images of any school photos in your collections would be much appreciated, as well as memories of school days. In addition, what fun it is to have the old Manfred News entries complementing the newsletter histories! These entries have been transcribed into the computer thanks to Ethel Bolyard, Elaine Homan, Wanda Melchert, Pam Norstedt, Audrey Solheim, and Maridel Sprenger.

History of One-Room Schools in Manfred Township

1892

Organization of St. Anna School District No. 20-21

The history of schools in Manfred Township began in 1892 when, by order of the Board of County Commissioners, school districts were to be organized in Wells County. On February 6, 1892, St. Anna Township and Manfred Township created one school district, naming it "St. Anna School District No. 20-21." The minutes of the organizational meeting follow:

Minutes of the organizational meeting February 6, 1892 to create St. Anna School District No. 20-21 consisting of Manfred and St. Anna Townships

An election held at the residence of M. Biever, Township 149, R 71, on the 6th day of February 1892 by order of the County Commissioners for the purpose of organizing Townships 148 R 71 (St. Anna Twp.) and 149 R 71 (Manfred Twp.) into one school district, at said Election M. Whitman and Jacob Weise acted as Judges. John Whitman and Wm. Goedecke acted as Clerks. The following officers were elected: Mr. Biever Director for 3 years, C. Borhech, Director for 2 years and Jacob Hildenbrandt until the next Election. Wm. Goedecke was elected Treasurer. A majority of the votes cast were in favor of St. Anna as the name of the school district.

School classes begin

Records indicate that Sadie Hutchinson was the first teacher at Manfred and that by 1894, she had 19 students. For the March 11-July 3, 1895 school term, she had 20 students. The School #1 building she taught in was located ¼ mile west and south of the Soo Line tracks at Manfred. Nellie Neidham taught 20 students at this school for a 60-day term, September 2-November 26, 1895.

Also in 1895, School #2 located NE of Manfred opened with Bertha Nertrost as teacher of 13 students for a 40-day term, September 30-November 22, 1895. School #3 located NW of Manfred opened that year with Garnet Glauqual as teacher for the October 7-December 27, 1895 term. The 1896 school census recorded 45 children enrolled –23 boys and 22 girls, as submitted by Torstein Rogne, Clerk.


Division of St. Anna School District No. 20-21 and the organization of Manfred School District No. 20

By 1897, the desire to separate St. Anna Township and Manfred Township into two school districts was voiced. On April 24, 1897, a special school district meeting was held for the purpose of acting on the division of the St. Anna School District to form two separate districts. The votes cast favored this division.

At the first school election for Manfred School District held May 1, 1897, Torstein Roble, Mads Nertrost, and Matt Biever were elected to the board of directors with Mads Nertrost being appointed president. P.B. Anderson was elected treasurer, and Tollef Roble was elected clerk for a salary of \$15 a year.

The three one-room schools of Manfred School District No. 20

The three one-room schools had been first established in Manfred Township when St. Anna Township and Manfred Township were joined as one school district. These three schools continued as **School #1** at Manfred, **School #2** northeast of Manfred known at first as the Nertrost School and later as the Solberg School, and **School #3** northwest of Manfred known as the Rogness School. We begin with School #1 during the years 1897-1909 while it was yet a one-room school.



School #1


The first building of School #1 was located near Manfred ½ mile west and south of the Soo Line tracks, having been moved to that site in 1895. In 1898, a new building for School #1 was built on a new site in the village of Manfred.

Second building for School #1

In 1898, a larger frame school building was constructed by O. S. Hedahl and T. T. Jorstad to serve as School #1 approximately where the present-day brick Manfred School is located. The outhouses were moved from the old school site of ½ south and west of Manfred and installed at the new school site in town.

News Entries from the Wells County Free Press

June 4, 1905

Last week Friday, Miss Sadie Trainor closed a very successful nine-month term of school. A number of people were in from the country to hear the program rendered by the pupils. They were all well trained for their special parts in recitations, singing, and marching. Miss Trainor is a very efficient teacher and has gained the esteem and friendship, not only of her pupils, but also of the whole community.

December 22, 1905

A Christmas tree with an appropriate program and school entertainment will be had at Manfred schoolhouse at 7 p. m. on Sunday the 24th. Everybody is welcome to participate.

May 25, 1906

A large delegation of school ma'ams had possession of the depot last Thursday evening, waiting for the "hundred and late". They went to Fessenden for the teacher's examination.

May 4, 1906

Miss Cecelia Rice observed Arbor Day in a most appropriate way last week Friday. With the assistance of her pupils she tidied up the schoolhouse, raked and cleaned up the yard and spaded up a small plat of ground wherein they planted flowers and trees.

June 1, 1906

Miss Cecelia Rice, who closed her school here last week, leaves Friday for her claim at Stordahl, Williams County. Miss Rice is a most proficient teacher and accomplished lady and during her stay here won a host of friends whose good wishes will accompany her to her future home in the far west.

March 1, 1907

Last Wednesday occurred the centennial anniversary of the birth of the American poet laureate, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, author of "Evangeline" and "Hiawatha". Miss Lundie and pupils observed the day in a most befitting manner by reading stanzas and quotations by the great man.

May 29, 1908

Miss Helen Hope closed a very successful nine-month term of school last Tuesday with a literary program which had drawn a crowded house of patrons of the school and children. The attendance has been the largest in the history of the school and it is too large for one teacher. What Manfred needs is an enlarged school house and two teachers.

June 11, 1909

Last Friday was the last day of a most successful school year. The attendance has outgrown the capacity of the schoolhouse and the work of one teacher. A good program was given and pupils and parents were treated to refreshments after the program was over.

October 22, 1909

In a spelling match held at school Friday afternoon, Cora Anderson carried off the honors.

School #2

School #2 was first opened in 1895 when Manfred Township and St. Anna Township operated as one school district. In 1897, that school district divided into two school districts. School #2 of the Manfred School District, located on the Mads Nertrost land, was known as the "Nertrost School." (1 on map, Sec. 11)

November 12, 1914 news entry in the Wells County Free Press Saturday afternoon a special school election was held to decide on a new location for the schoolhouse known as the Nertrost School. The votes cast were 50-17 in favor to move the building a mile further north from its present location.

In about 1915, the school building #2 was moved from the Nertrost land to the Solberg land, SE 1/4 Sec. 2, then becoming known as the "Solberg School." (2 on map, Sec. 2) The July 12, 1917 school board minutes recorded, "School house No. 2 in district No. 20 was inspected and found unfit for school purposes." In 1918 this building was sold and a new building erected. In December of 1922, it burned to the ground and was rebuilt in 1923. School #2 was closed in 1935, and the students transferred to School #1.

June 7, 1912

Schools 2 and 3 of the Manfred district in charge of Misses Anderson and Nertrost combined in a picnic Friday, June 21, in the Nertrost grove north of town. The children from both schools together with parents and

> friends arrived in time for dinner, after which a program was rendered by the schools. Superintendent Maude Regan entertained the children with several amusing stories. At five o'clock the children returned home feeling that a very enjoyable day had been spent.

June 27, 1913

Cora Anderson finished a term of school in Manfred district last Friday. School closed with a picnic in the C. C. Melby grove.

January 13, 1916

Miss Carrie Thompson started her school Monday, January 3, and also Miss DeVoe (#3) the same date.

June 6, 1918

A very good entertainment was given by the children of School No. 2 Manfred Township Saturday evening for the benefit of the Red Cross of which said school is a member. The

program consisted of patriotic songs, recitations and a humorous comedy, Oliver Berve gave two solos on his violin, accompanied on the organ by the efficient teach of the school, Miss Amanda Stuve. The whole program showed a wise selection of suitable recitations and songs and the rendering of the different selections by the scholars showed careful training by the teacher who is well versed in music and the art of oratory and declamation. The sale of baskets brought the sum of \$24, which will be given to the Red Cross. (World War I ended later in 1918)

A basket social and program was given Friday night in School No. 2 where Miss Helgerud teaches. The children

did well in giving their program. A large number of baskets were sold. Lunch was served to those who were not fortunate enough to get a basket. The proceeds are believed to be going for a school bell. Games were played by the young people and everybody reported a good time.

December 10, 1931

A spelling contest will be held this week between the two Manfred schools.

December 29, 1932

Several families from Manfred attended the program given by Miss Mildred Ongstad and her pupils in her school Thursday evening.

November 9, 1933

Miss Mildred Ongstad, Miss Eleanor Langlie and Myrtle Melby accompanied Herbert and his mother, Mrs. S. H. Ongstad to Minot where they attended a teacher's convention. They left Thursday and returned Sunday.

After the Manfred School District was organized in 1897, residents in the northwest part of Manfred Township requested classes for their area. Not having an adequate school facility available, the 1897 and 1898 terms were held in one room of the Knud Melby farmhouse. (1 on map, Sec. 8) In 1898, voters supported moving the old School #1 building to Knud Melby's land Section 17 (2 on map, Sec. 17) for use as School #3, becoming then known as the "Melby School."

The October 11, 1898 school board minutes recorded, "Contract to move old schoolhouse was let to B. Rogne for the sum of \$25.00." At the February 1899 school board meeting, bids on repair for the Melby School were made with Ole Hedahl's bid being accepted.

By 1908, there was need of a new building for School #3.

April 17, 1908 issue of the Wells County Free Press

A movement is on foot to build a new modern and up-to-date schoolhouse to take the place of schoolhouse No. 3. The number of children has increased in that school and the old school house was the first one erected in this township under the old pioneer conditions, so a new school is a necessity and we believe it will be built and built right.

A new school building was then constructed in 1908 on land deeded from Carl Olson located on the southwest corner of the SE ½ of Sec. 5 (3 on map, Sec. 5). School #3 then became known as the "Rogness School." In 1919, because of overcrowding, it was necessary for some of the School #3 students to attend School #1. That year a heating plant was added in this school, and repairs and painting were also done. School #3 was closed in 1928, and the students transferred to School #1.

January 2, 1919

Those who attended the Christmas program at Miss Welch's school report a good time.

March 21, 1921

Quite a number of young people from both Manfred and Fram were present at the basket social given at School No. 3 Saturday evening. Baskets didn't go very high, but nevertheless a fair amount was realized. After lunch, the seats were moved aside and everybody enjoyed the balance of the evening at games, and all present report that a jolly good time was had.
