In Norway

"The Ranum name is not so unusual in America, so it seems," writes Elaine Nelson Homan, a great great granddaughter of Juel and Guri Ranum. "In Norway, there are several fylkes (counties) with farms by the name of Ranum (and variant spellings) and no doubt, members of these families also immigrated to America. There is no evidence of relationship other than the similarity of names. There is evidence that a Ranum fought in the US Civil War and the surname Ranum is found in many cities. But this story is about the early Manfred pioneer, Juel Ranum, his wife Guri Melby and their only child, Ole Juelson Ranum and his descendants."

Juel (Juul) Olsen/Oleson Stokkebryn Ranum, born July 2, 1835 at Stokkebryn, Nord Aurdal in Valdres, Norway, was the youngest of 10 children born to Ole Olsen Stokkebryn Ranum (b.1787), and Ingri Gundersdotter Bjorgum. Elaine Homan wrote "The Ranum farm must have been a large one because the 1801 Norwegian Census lists over 80 people who lived on this farm in different family groups or single workers. Juel's father, Ole, became the head of this farm."

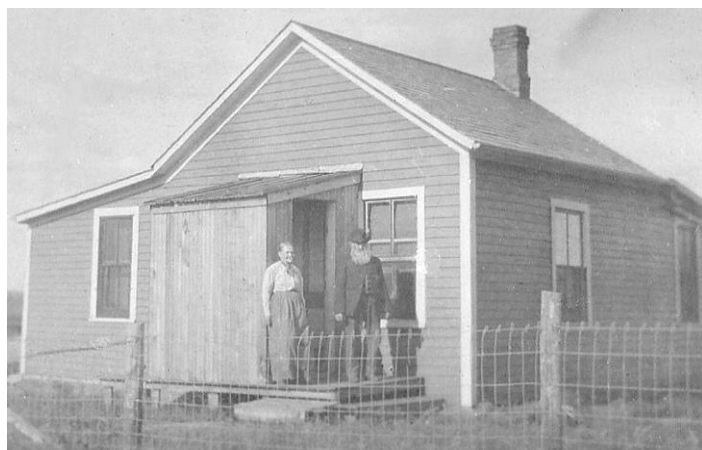
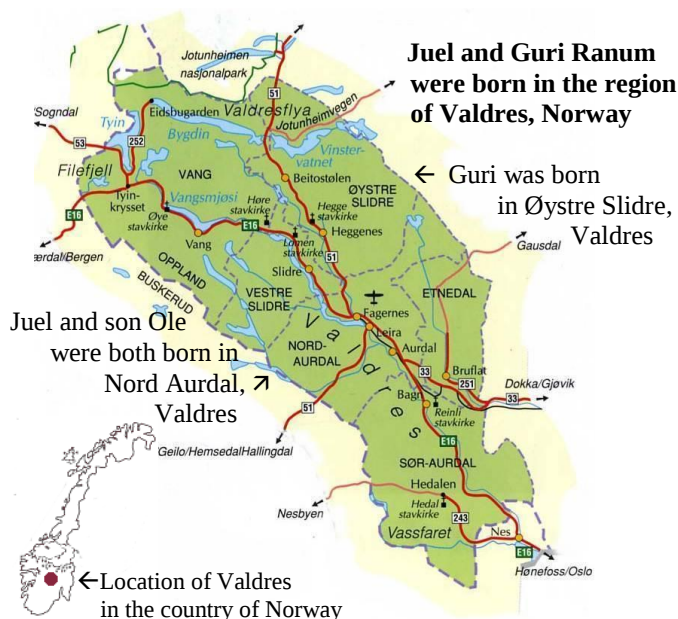
In 1858 at Rogne, Østre Slidre (now spelled Øystre Slidre), Juel married **Guri** Gulbrandsdotter Melby, born January 21, 1841 at Rogne, Østre Slidre in Valdres, Norway. Their son Ole Juelson was born September 10, 1858 at Ranum in Stokkebryn, Nord Aurdal.

Elaine Homan relates that by the time of the 1865 census, the Ranum farm appears to have been subdivided with Juel's eldest brother Ole Oleson/Olson Ranum (b.1811) being the head of the Ranum/Stokkebryn farm. That census indicates that, at that time, Juel, Guri and their 7-year old son were living at the nearby farm of Naes (Øvre).

Coming to America

In her research, Elaine Homan found that according to the 1900, 1910, and 1920 US Census, Juel and Guri, together with their son Ole then 11 years old, immigrated to America in 1870. John and Julia became their Americanized names.

Juel and Guri lived first in Winona County, MN for four years, then three years in Northfield, MN after which they took a homestead in Lyon County, MN near Ghent and later lived at Cottonwood. They then settled at Manfred, ND in 1909 and were members of Vang Lutheran Church. Member Adolph Shirley recalled Juel and Knud Melby sitting together on the men's side for services every Sunday. Juel died July 6, 1916 and Guri died July 17, 1933, both passing at Manfred and are buried in Vang Church Cemetery, Manfred, ND.

The Ole and Guri Ranum Family

Ole Juelson Ranum was born September 10, 1858 in Stokkebryn, North Aurdal, Valdres, Norway to Juel (John) Olson Ranum and Guri (Julia) Gulbrandsdotter Melby. Ole came to the USA in 1870 with his parents, settling in southwestern Minnesota.

Records show that Ole was included on a list of students in the class of 1875-1876 at St. Olaf's Academy of Northfield, MN. He experienced quite a day September 6, 1876, just four days before his 18th birthday. The James Gang consisting of Frank and Jesse James, 3 Youngers brothers and three others attempted to rob the First National Bank of Northfield. During the shootout, the bank teller, a bystander and a gang member were killed. Ole dove into a rain barrel. A few days later the 3 Youngers were captured, two gang members killed, with Frank and Jesse James escaping.

In 1884, Ole took over the farming operation of his parents at Ghent in Lyon County, MN. That same year, Ole met **Guri** Melby when she and her parents and siblings were traveling through Lyon County in the process of moving from southwestern Minnesota to North Dakota. They had stopped to visit Guri's aunt and family who lived in Lyon County. On May 30, 1885 at Minneota, MN, Ole and Guri were united in marriage. Guri was born February 17, 1862 at Rogne, Valdres, Norway to Knud Olson (Røe) Melby and Guri Kristensdotter Melby. The Melbys moved to America in 1881. (See the Manfred Newsletter, December 2004 issue)

All of Ole and Guri's children were born to them while they lived in Minnesota: George in 1886, (Konrad) Oscar in 1887, and Emil in 1890 were born at Minneota; Ida in 1892 and Clara in 1894 were born at Cottonwood, but sadly Ida died in 1895 when she was only three years old; Gladys was born in 1899 at Madison.

Elaine Homan said of those years, "Ole must have worked in grain elevators and/or stores as he corresponded on several occasions about various business details. An ink blotter book that Ole and his father Juel used still survives and though most of the ink has faded, some parts such as dates and locations and goods are still visible. This book has dates from 1879 to about 1889. Both men had excellent handwriting and wrote both in English and Norwegian. It is also a good indicator that farming was not the only enterprise that interested the 2 men since there are letters sent to supply companies on behalf of grain elevators and hardware/general stores."

When the family came to ND in 1900, they located first at Voltaire, ND where Ole helped establish the post office in January 1901 and served as its first postmaster for five years. In 1905, the Ranum family moved to Manfred where they started farming. The Manfred School records list Clara and Gladys as students beginning in September 1905. A new house and a big barn were built on their homestead in 1906. In July of 1914, lightning set fire and burned their barn, which they had rebuilt in September.

Ole and Guri took an active part in Vang Lutheran Church. With their new home completed, Guri was then able to take turns in hosting the Vang Ladies Aid Society in her home. They each held leadership positions at Vang: Ole as Treasurer for six years and later three terms as Deacon; and Guri in the Vang Ladies Aid as Treasurer two years, and one term each as President and Secretary.

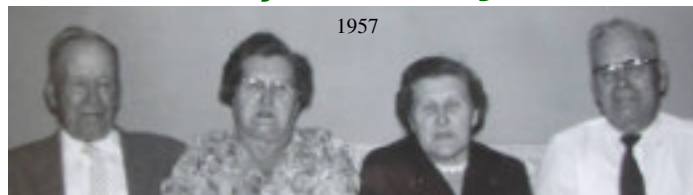

In addition to farming, Ole worked in various positions in Manfred. During 1905-1906, he served as grain buyer for the Ireys Elevator and in 1906 became grain buyer for the Farmers Elevator. Sadly, their son Oscar also died that same year. The Manfred News entries from the Wells County Free Press indicate that in 1909 Ole became manager for the C. C. Melby general store, and in 1911 he returned to the Farmers Elevator as grain buyer. On January 3, 1914, Ole became postmaster of the Manfred Post Office, at which time, he and Guri took up residency in Manfred during his years as postmaster. He continued in this position until January 30, 1921. Through the years, he also filled in at the Farmers Elevator as needed. He served on the school board as clerk, and in 1924 was elected as Treasurer of Manfred Township.

Though Ole experienced poor health in later years, he and Guri were blessed to celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary in 1935. Ole died March 30, 1938 at the home of his daughter Gladys Pfundheller at Sanish, where he and Guri had been visiting. Pallbearers were Ole Onstad, Ole Rudi, Jens Renden, Halvor Olsen, Reier Riestad and Ingvald Ravnaas. Guri died soon after on October 22, 1938 at Manfred. Both are buried at the Vang Cemetery.

George Juel Ranum was born March 15, 1886 at Ghent, MN. In 1905, he and his parents and siblings settled near Manfred. The newspaper entries indicate he was living in Fargo in 1907. By 1911, he had moved to Revelstoke, British Columbia where he served as a train dispatcher, rules examiner and station agent for the Canadian Pacific Railroad. It was here that he met Inez Mitchell born August 3, 1894 in St. Thomas, Ontario, and they married in about 1910. In 1916, they homesteaded at Van Hook, ND, and after proving up the homestead they moved to Raub for a time where George engaged in the banking business. Later, they moved back to Van Hook where he operated a service station until his retirement in 1953. During the last six years of his life, they lived at Vancouver, WA.

George died April 28, 1959 and is interred at Evergreen Memorial Gardens in Vancouver, WA. Inez later married George W. Acock. She died March 17, 1970 in Portland, OR and is interred at Evergreen Memorial Gardens in Vancouver, WA.

Two children were born to George and Inez: 1 Gordon married Jean Lockrem and they had three children: 1 Roger; 2 Virginia married Robert Studebaker and they had three children Richard, Deborah and Michael; and 3 George. 2 June married Lester Beekman and they had two children: 1 Ricky and 2 Carmen.

Ole and Guri Ranum's 2nd child - Oscar

2 (Konrad) Oscar Ranum

Oscar was born November 21, 1887 and died June 25, 1906 when he was 18½ years old. He had been working at the Soo Line station at Carrington. An entry in the Wells County Free Press indicates he died as a result of tuberculosis of the brain, having been sick for only a week before he died.

3 *Emil and Katie Ranum Family*

Emil Gerhard (E. G.) Ranum was born in Ghent, Lyon County, Minnesota, January 3, 1890. His parents, Ole and Guri Ranum, moved to North Dakota about 1900, living first at Voltaire, ND where his father Ole served as postmaster and in 1905 the family settled at Manfred, ND. Emil graduated from 8th grade at Manfred and then apprenticed to a tinsmith. The Feb 28 and Mar 6, 1908 entries in the Manfred News of the Wells County Free Press indicate that Emil was serving as a rural mail route driver at that time. A Nov 6, 1908 entry tells of a trip he took to Canada, "Emil Ranum, Oscar Melby and Ole Lysaker caught the Canada fever and made a hurried trip to file on land."

His future began taking shape in 1909 as recorded in a May 7th entry, "Mads Nertrøst and Emil Ranum returned from Fargo where they have taken a course at a business college." (Aakers Business College in Fargo) He was soon hired by brothers Will and Ted Lierbo to work at their bank in Turtle Lake, ND as indicated in a Dec 30, 1909 entry, "Emil Ranum, the smiling banker of Turtle Lake, is spending his Christmas vacation with his parents. Emil once remarked that he, at one time, intended entering the undertaking profession, but on serious sober thought aided and abetted by a series of grave reflections, he was afraid that his smile, which can't come off, would be misunderstood." (As penned by the colorful Manfred News writer Sven Grane.)

Emil met Katie (Kate) Amelia Babcock at Turtle Lake. She was born in Richland County, Iowa, January 1, 1893. Her parents moved to Flandreau, South Dakota when she was an infant, and in 1903 moved to Turtle Lake. From Katie's August 24, 1909 diary entry she wrote, "Met Mr. Renum and Dr. Paulson.", and the August 29th entry reads, "Windy today. I went to church and Sunday school. After dinner, Hazel Lattin and Emil Rennum came after me and I went to play tennis. We walked up to West's for Maud. I went to church in evening." In 1911, Emil and Katie rode the train to Carrington and were married by the Methodist minister there. Emil and Katie's first child, Emil Gerald, was born later that same year in Turtle Lake.

Emil and Katie Ranum moved to Mountrail County in 1915, before the Van Hook town site was established and the lots sold. Their first living quarters were in a small frame building which was also temporary quarters for the First National Bank, which he established and became its Executive Vice-President. When the town lots were sold, they purchased property for the bank and also for their home. At the organizational meeting of the Van Hook village board, August 25, 1915, Emil was elected president of the board, Van Hook's first mayor. Seven more children were born to them while they lived in Van Hook: Muriel 1916, Verna 1918, Jean 1920, Donna 1922, Jim 1925, Dick 1927 and Kathy 1935. They built the family home in 1919. Emil became a successful business man, and also acquired farmland. He served on the school board for many years and was interested in other civic and business organizations. Katie was a member of the Ladies Civic league, the Homemakers Club and the WCTU. The center of their activities was the Church of the Nazarene of which they were charter members. The first services of the church were held in the Ranum home.

In 1930, Emil opened an International Harvester agency. The stock market 'crash' of 1929 had almost no immediate impact on rural ND, but as time passed the economy of the entire country ground nearly to a halt. The great depression, coupled with a severe drought on the Great Plains during the 'dirty thirties' affected everyone. The First National Bank, along with many other area banks, failed in August 1931. Emil and Katie held out until 1937, and then Emil took a job with the Bank of North Dakota and moved the family to Bismarck, less Gerald and Muriel who had married. He accepted a new territory the next year and the family moved again, to Valley City. He resigned after a few years and established an insurance and real estate business which he continued into the 1960s. He was a member of the Valley City Kiwanis Club. Katie died March 31, 1973 and Emil died July 8th of that same year. Services were held at the Church of the Nazarene, and both are buried in Memory Gardens east of Valley City, ND.

5 *Ole and Clara Gladheim Family*

Clara Jeanette Ranum was born May 23, 1894 in Cottonwood, Lyon Co. MN, the 5th of 6 children to Ole J. and Guri K. (Melby) Ranum. Clara's family traveled from MN to ND, living in several places before settling at Manfred in 1905. She attended Manfred School and in 1909 was confirmed in the Lutheran faith at Vang Church in Manfred. The young adults were encouraged to acquire land, and Clara did so when land became available in Mountrail County, ND. Manfred News entry in the Wells County Free Press October 28, 1915 relates, "Miss Clara Ranum, Miss Mary Hovey, Miss Gena Roble and Miss Emma Opdahl, departed for Minot where they all will draw a number on the reservation land."

About that time, Clara met Ole Gladheim when he came to Manfred to visit his aunt (his father's sister), Anna (Stokkebryn) Melby, wife of Christen Christenson (C. C.) Melby. Ole and Clara shared a common lineage in that their paternal grandfathers' were brothers. Ole's grandfather, Ole Olson Ranum/Stokkebryn born 1811 was the oldest in the family, and Clara's grandfather, Juel Olson Ranum/Stokkebryn born 1835 was the youngest, born to Ole Olson Ranum/Stokkebryn born 1787 and Ingri Gundersdotter Bjorgum.

Ole Bernhard Gladheim was born on July 18, 1895 in Oystre Slidre, Valdres, Norway (see map page 3), on Stokkebryn, a farm owned by his parents, Ole O. Stokkebryn and his wife Barbro O. Gladheim. Barbro died soon after childbirth and young Ole was raised by his mother's parents, Ole and Marit Gladheim, on the Gladheim farm. Ole took the name Gladheim and, at age 16, sailed to the US on the *Lusitania*, landing in NY on March 15, 1912 with friends Nils Jorstad who took a farm at Manfred, and Halvord Haganes. Ole brought with him a small wooden trunk inscribed with the name of his grandfather, Ole Gladheim, and the date 1870, which continues to be passed down through the generations.

On March 8, 1916, Ole Gladheim and Clara Ranum were at Minot. Shortly after this, Ole and Clara moved to Sanish, ND in Big Bend Township where they homesteaded a farm on the cliffs overlooking the Missouri River to the west. Born to them were eight children: Bernice, Mildred, Gerda, Doris, Ordean, twins Cora and Ora, and Carol. As in Manfred, the area around Sanish and Van Hook had many other families related to Clara, including her brother and sister's families. But the 1930's were not good for the Gladheim family there, and they moved back to Manfred where they took on farming the farm of Clara's parents (see map, house and barn pictured on page 4).

The Gladheim family became active in the Manfred community and organizations. They became members of Vang Church in 1936. Ole served as Treasurer for six years, Clara served as Vang Ladies Aid Vice President two terms. Their children confirmed at Vang Church were Gerda in 1935, Doris in 1938, Ordeen in 1940, twins Cora and Ora in 1943, and Carol in 1947. They were active in Fagerlund Sons of Norway Lodge where Ole was known for his skill in performing the spring dance, a difficult dance of unusual rhythm which he had learned in Norway. Mrs. Oscar (Bertha) Melby had also learned this dance in Norway during her youth and often served as partner for Ole or for Even Ostrem who could also do the spring dance. Ole died October 30, 1952, killed in an auto accident while traveling in Montana. After his death, Clara sold the farm to her oldest daughter Bernice and her husband, Vern Nelson. Clara lived in Minot for many years before relocating to Vancouver, WA to live with her daughters there. Clara died February 15, 1986. Both Ole and Clara are laid to rest in the Vang Lutheran Cemetery in Manfred, just a short walk south from their farm.

Bernice was born in 1916. She married at San Francisco, CA in 1941 to Vern Nelson born in 1913 at Tolley, ND. Prior to WWII, Bernice's sister, Mildred had gone out to San Francisco, CA to work, after which time Bernice joined her to work there also. Bernice and Vern had been acquainted in ND. Vern also came out to San Francisco to work, and there Bernice and Vern were married. While in CA, Vern went to carpenter school and worked as a carpenter for a short time until WWII began. Vern and Bernice then moved back to ND and began farming on Ole and Guri Ranum's homestead - the farm of her parents, just north of Manfred. (See map, house, and barn page 4). Bernice died in 1970, and Vern in 1996.

Vern and Bernice had seven children:

- 1 Vernon married Rita Parker and they have two children: Anthony 'Tony,' and Ronald 'Ron.'
- 2 Warren married Kathy, and later married Jenny. He has two children: Sherrall, and Dennis.
- 3 Robert 'Bob' married Ardis 'Ardy' Moe and they have two children: Jeffrey, and Jennifer, and also two grandchildren Jessica and Jordan.
- 4 George married Judy Martin and they have two children: Dion, and Melissa married Fred Schumaker and they have two children Kailyn and Josh.

2 Mildred Gladheim Nelson

Mildred was born in 1918. Her family moved to Manfred in 1934. In 1936, she began teacher's training in Minot. In 1939, she met Olaf Conrad Nelson at Manfred. He was born in 1911 to Herbert and Marget Nelson. Marget had grown up near the Gladheim farm in Norway. Herbert was employed as a RR track foreman in Manfred for a few years. Olaf chose the US Marine Corps for his career, enlisting in 1930. Mildred and Olaf eloped to Yuma, AZ on July 5, 1941. During WWII, Olaf first served as a boot camp and rifle instructor, and in 1943 entered combat in the Pacific. Mildred and their new son Conrad (Sonny) lived with her parents in Manfred for the duration of the war. While at Manfred, Mildred filled in as a teacher for a year. Upon Olaf's return, three more children were born. Olaf continued with the Marines and Mildred raised their family. By 1951, they were stationed in Camp Pendleton, CA. He retired there in 1960. In 1962, Olaf died during surgery, one year after their son Conrad had died. Mildred moved to Minot, ND in 1963 with her three remaining children and restarted her teaching career. She died in 1978.

Born to Mildred and Olaf were four children:

3 Gerda Gladheim Berkly

Gerda was born in 1921. She and her family moved to Manfred in 1934, where she and her younger siblings took their schooling. Gerda married Gordon Berkly. She served in the Army during WW II, and died in 1961. Born to Gerda and Gordon were two children: Kathryn, and Linda.

4 Doris Gladheim Lippelgoos

Doris was born in 1924, and married Charles (Chuck) Lippelgoos in 1945 at San Diego where Chuck was stationed while in the Navy. Five children were born to them: Bonnie, Charles (Butch), Dennis, Mickey, and Rich. The family resided in Vancouver, WA where Chuck worked at Alcoa for many years. Chuck died in 1993. Their son Dennis died in 1998. Doris continues to live in Vancouver with several of her children and grandchildren nearby.

6 *Raymond and Gladys Pfundheller Family*

Gladys Oline Ranum was born June 11, 1899 at Madison, MN. In sharing about her life, she wrote that when she was a year old her parents moved to Voltaire, ND. The family lived there until she was six years old, at which time they moved to Manfred. Gladys attended Manfred grade school and in 1913 was confirmed in the Lutheran faith at Vang Church. The 1913-1914 Manfred News relates that she then went to school at Turtle Lake where her older brother Emil lived, and by 1917 she was attending school at Fessenden. She graduated from there, after which time she taught three years of country school. She taught two years at Big Bend School south of present-day Sanish near Grand Valley Church in Mountrail County where she boarded with the Tommerdahl family and later stayed with her sister Clara, and then taught one year at Powers Lake, ND.

Gladys met Raymond Pfundheller while teaching at Big Bend School, and on December 29, 1920 they married at Manfred. Raymond was born January 5, 1896 at Fontanelle, Iowa. The Pfundheller family moved to Van Hook, ND in 1913 and began farming. Later, Raymond acquired his own farm 1½ miles north of Grand Valley Church. In addition to farming, he also worked for the Soil Conservation Office and for the elevator in New Town. He and Gladys farmed until 1953 when they moved to New Town. Raymond enjoyed the hobby of working with leather. Gladys enjoyed crocheting and embroidery work, and was active in Homemakers Club and the Ladies Aid. Gladys died on May 31, 1974 and Raymond on June 19, 1987, both passing away at New Town, ND. They are buried at Grand Valley Lutheran Cemetery south of Sanish, ND.

Three children were born to Raymond and Gladys: Phyllis in 1922, Hillard in 1927 and Lois in 1929. *Phyllis* married Adolph Ritzke. They farmed near Van Hook, and later moved to New Town. Adolph then worked for the Farmer's Union service station, and Phyllis worked for the New Town School system in the kitchen. Adolph died in 1974 when he was only 51 years old, and Phyllis died in 2007. Phyllis and Adolph had two children, Cheryl and Lynda. **1** Cheryl married Bert Holcomb and they have three children **1**Douglas married Shannon Murphy and they have two children Braden and Ethan, **2**Chad married Meredith Christie and they have two children Lauren and Matthew, **3**Ryan married Natalie Scheirmann. **2** Lynda married Willis Bancroft and they had two children **1**Dean married Angela Ruff and they have two children Benjamin and Elizabeth, **2**Nicole married Tim Quandt, and later married Ian Mills and they have a son Macalister. Lynda later married Walter Ouradnik, and to them was born a daughter Rachelle.

Hillard married Maxine Ove. They farmed near Van Hook and later south of Sanish. In 1964, they moved to St. Ignacious, MT where they ranched and later moved to other locations. Brent later married Janice Brown. 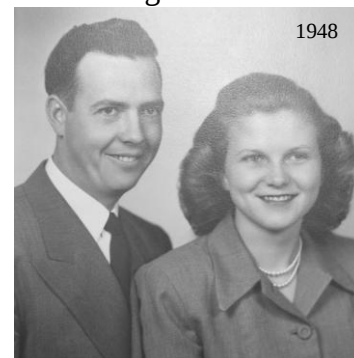

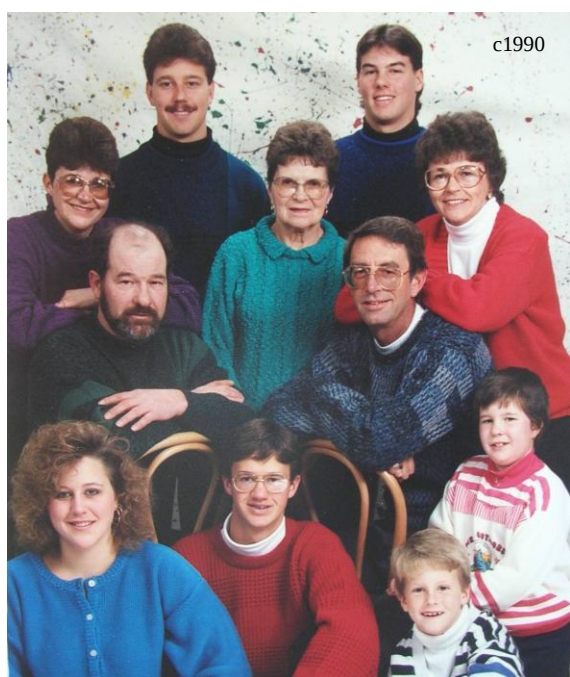
